

## SUBMISSION BY THE GOVERNMENT OF THE REPUBLIC OF INDONESIA

Pursuant to the Decision 19/CMA.1 during UNFCCC COP-24 in Katowice, December 2018, on "Matters relating to Article 14 of the Paris Agreement and paragraphs 99–101 of decision 1/CP.21" (FCCC/PA/CMA/2018/3/Add.2), the Government of the Republic of Indonesia herewith submits views on the work of the first Global Stocktake Modalities on (1) information collection and preparations, (2) Technical Assessment, and (3) Considerations of Outputs, as follows:

- 1) *Information Collected and preparations:* focusing on gathering, compiling and synthesizing information and preparing for conducting the technical assessment:
  - a. Indonesia is of the view that information collected for the first Global Stocktake, should be originated from the source of inputs referred to in paragraph 36 and 37 (Decision 19/CMA.1).

An assessment and validation process should be conducted for:

- all Non-Party Stakeholders (NPS) and observer organizations (agencies, bodies, institutions) that are eligible to submit and prior to their submission; and
- the types of data and information that will be used as sources of input.

Additionally, a submission procedure for primary data (submitted by parties) or additional/complementary data (submitted by NPS) should be followed by a validation and verification process.

Therefore, Indonesia urges the Parties to prepare and develop (a) a guideline that consists of mechanism, procedure and criteria of NPS and observer organizations that are eligible to submit to the GST report (b). Standard types of data and information, (c). a submission procedure including a scheme for validation and verification process.

- b. All of the inputs to the GST that are submitted by PS and NPS should be aligned with and apply the methodology of assessment in accordance with IPCC Guidelines. To avoid overlapping report and double counting, data and information that are submitted by NPS and observer organizations, should follow UNFCCC Secretariat Guidelines.
- 2) *Technical Assessment*: focusing on taking stock of the implementation of the Paris Agreement to assess the collective progress towards achieving the purpose and long-term goals of the Paris Agreement:
  - a. Indonesia urges that the Parties approve the GST Modalities and Sources of input that also includes procedure, mechanism and timeline in the UN Climate Change Conference 2022 (COP 27), and suggests the SBSTA to provide all necessary preparations and modalities.

- b. These guidelines consist of mechanism and scheme to implement technical assessment that should be directed by parties and conducted solely to assess and to improve clarity, transparency and understanding
- 3) Considerations of output: focusing on discussing the implications of the findings of the technical assessment with a view to achieving the outcome of the global stocktake of informing Parties in updating and enhancing, in a nationally determined manner, their actions and support:

Indonesia views that the result of the 1<sup>st</sup> GST should indicate the collective progress towards achieving the purpose and long-term goals of the Paris Agreement, and might be used as a basis to update and enhance NDCs, strengthening policy and strategies of climate change mitigation and adaptation and to unlock international cooperation including capacity building for the PS and NPS.

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
